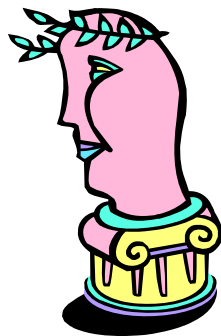


Classics is the area of scholarly study that **investigates the Greek and Roman past** in order to understand ourselves in relation to that past.

The B.A. in Humanities degree with a Concentration in Classics consists of team-taught interdisciplinary courses with faculty in Philosophy and Religious Studies as well as courses on the Roman and Greek civilizations.

- ✚ to provide a degree in Humanities with a concentration in Classics,
- ✚ to give instruction in Greek that fulfills the language requirement and serves as a minor in many colleges, and
- ✚ to offer general humanities courses in Classics and literature that fulfill the humanities or literature requirements of many colleges.



WHAT CAN I DO WITH A MAJOR IN CLASSICS?

Degrees in Classics and Latin provide a broad base of **knowledge** and **intellectual skills** that enable people to be **flexible** and **versatile** in a constantly changing job environment. In particular these degrees provide:

➤ **Language expertise** that may lead to the **study** and **teaching** of Latin, Greek and Romance Languages such as Spanish and French in public and private schools as well as at the college and university level.

➤ A solid basis for **graduate training** in law and medicine;

➤ Preparation for occupations in and connected with **Classical Archaeology** which include

field archaeology (involving additional skills in photography, drafting, or surveying),

materials conservation (the preservation of antiquities that have been recovered),

museum work (where interest and education in art history are valuable), and

the **travel and tourist industry** (planning and conducting tours through classical countries like Italy, Greece, and Turkey);

➤ A basis for work in various **public service agencies** where there has been a long tradition of people with a classical education.

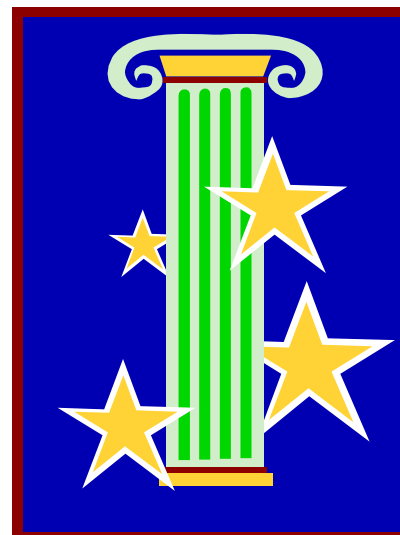
