Class Participation, Participation, and Punctuality:

This is not a lecture course. In order to meet the objectives of the course, you will need to arrive at each class on time, having completed the assigned reading and writing and prepared yourself to participate intelligently in the discussion. Please arrive fully prepared to make presentations or submit accompanying documents when you are scheduled. Participation also includes providing grounded, actionable feedback to classmates following their presentations. In order for you to demonstrate the skills necessary for this course, you will be required to participate in group activities.

From time to time, it will be necessary for you to prepare for class on your own time. These activities will require you to complete research. There will be an addition of 50 points for participation added to your total points accumulated for the semester. Failure to participate in class, with the completed assignments on time will result in the deduction of points from this category.

Make-up Work:

It is expected that you will turn in all work by the due date. If for some unforeseen reason you need extra time then ask. Exceptions will be made on an individual basis. Exams and speeches/ presentations must be taken / delivered on the date that they are scheduled. Only a University Excused Absence will be considered in order for these items to be made up. Any assignments turned in late will be cut the amount of points equal to one letter grade, per class late. (Since we meet every other day tardiness will only count on class days). No email copies of assignments will be accepted unless a prior arrangement has been made and accepted by me.

University Policy on Absences and Make-up Work:

According to Student Affairs, in order to be officially excused from class, a student must secure a University Excused Absence upon returning to class. This does not mean waiting two weeks and then expecting me to allow you to make-up the assignments that you missed. Be proactive. It is the responsibility of the student to request an opportunity to complete missed assignments. Students should be aware that excessive absences—whether excused or unexcused—may affect their ability to earn a passing grade. Regardless of the nature of the excused absence, the student is responsible for completing all coursework prior to the end of the semester.

Professionalism:

Students are required to conduct and present themselves in a professional manner. **Each student will be required to wear a suit during their presentations**. Failure to do so will result in the dropping of one letter grade.

Extra Credit:

Anyone who attends every class will receive 10 points extra credit. There may be, from time to time, extra credit given at the discretion of the instructor.

Mutual Respect:

Please treat each other with mutual respect. Hatred of any kind will not be tolerated. Our class is made up of a diverse population and it must be respected regardless of our differences. Embrace diversity!

Cell Phones:

Cell phones must be turned off and put away. Texting in class is unacceptable behavior. If you are caught, **and you will be,** you will be asked to leave the class for the day.

Oral Performances:

Each assignment will follow the event rules of the <u>National Forensic Association</u>. Each even will be delivered from a manuscript and must be within 8 – 10 minutes in length. Failure to meet to expected time frame may result in a deduction in points.
