In this course, students will identify, examine, and evaluate theories of performance and use their knowledge of those theories to understand and evaluate various elements of their own culture in part by comparing and contrasting their own culture with other cultures through an examination of cultural rituals, celebrations and art forms. This will be achieved through class discussions on assigned readings, written assignments such as article summaries and reflection papers that deal specifically with cultural differences and a performance of an intercultural text that guide students' reflection on the similarities and differences across cultures.
