Course Description

This course examines communication processes that influence human behavior and public policy through health promotion campaigns, including theories and practices of health behavior change and designing, implementing, and evaluating health communication interventions.

Course Requirements

All assignment guidelines will be posted on Blackboard (MU Online). Guidelines will include instructions and rubrics that will be used to determine your grade.

- 1. Reflections (5 points each, 60 points)— In 12 weeks, students will be asked to complete a 1.5-page, double spaced reflection that synthesizes and applies the course reading and class material. Students will be asked how the topic and materials of the week informed their own thinking as health citizens and potential future health practitioners. Students will also be asked to identify what questions and tensions exist after the week, and how the week's material can be synthesized into the larger framework of the course. I will be reading to see how your incorporate key concepts from the assigned chapter. I encourage you to incorporate as many key concepts as possible. Each submission should have at least five specific references to the text or class material. Students may use the style manual of their choice (MLA/APA), but use it consistently and correctly. Title each paper "Last name, Think Piece #" (# represents the appropriate module number). Before you write and submit Think Piece 1, read the document titled "Writing Advice" in the "Course Content" folder. This document explains how to organize analytical writing.
- 2. Health Professional Interview & Analysis (150 points) You will conduct an informational interview with a paid member of a health organization that focuses on their experiences and use of communication in their profession. The first step of this project is to construct a series of interview questions that focus on different areas of communication within their field. You will be guided through this process and turn in your interview questions to be evaluated <u>before</u> conducting the interview (50 points). After conducting the interview, you will then write a report (100 points) that focuses on the role of communication in the health professional's career. The report will discuss the health organization where the professional works, the health issues they address, the information you garnered from interviewing the health professional about the role of communication in their work, and an analysis of yourself as an aspiring health professional taking what you have learned from the interview into consideration. Guidelines and rubrics for this project are posted on Blackboard.

- **3. Presentation about Health Communication in the Field (100 points)** Using your research and information from the health professional interview, you will create a 15-minute presentation titled "Health Communication Challenges in X." For this presentation, you will discuss 3 major communication challenges in this context (contexts can be professional fields, special populations, or other areas) and best practices for overcoming these obstacles. Guidelines and a rubric for this presentation are posted on Blackboard.
- 4. Examinations (50 points each, 100 points total): There will be 2 exams in this course. The midterm exam will cover chapters 1-6; the final exam will cover chapters 7-9 & 11-12 (we will skip Chapter 10). Exams will consist of true/false, multiple choice, and matching questions. Examinations are open book and notes, but students are expected to complete the exams on their own.
