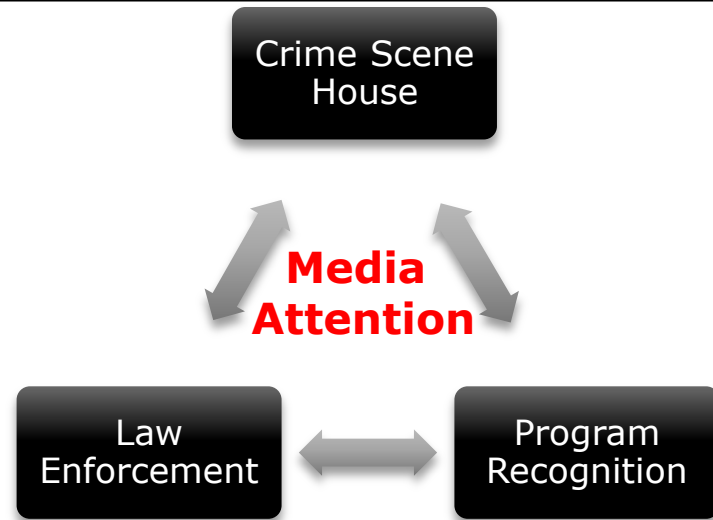

HUNTINGTON — Fingerprinting, firearms and forensics altogether were part of the educational experience Friday morning at the Marshall University Forensic Science Crime Scene House for about 35 students from two area high schools.

Students from Fairview High School in Ashland and Notre Dame High School in Portsmouth attended the “C.S.I.: Huntington” event at the crime scene house located at 1524 5th Ave. in Huntington, less than a block away from Marshall’s main campus.

During the workshop, students participated in demonstrations and hands-on experiments including ballistics and firearms identification, latent print development, handwriting analysis, blood pattern analysis, outdoor crime scene investigations and digital forensics.

The workshops are hosted by members of Marshall’s chapter of the MUFIA, a student organization comprised of forensic science graduate students.

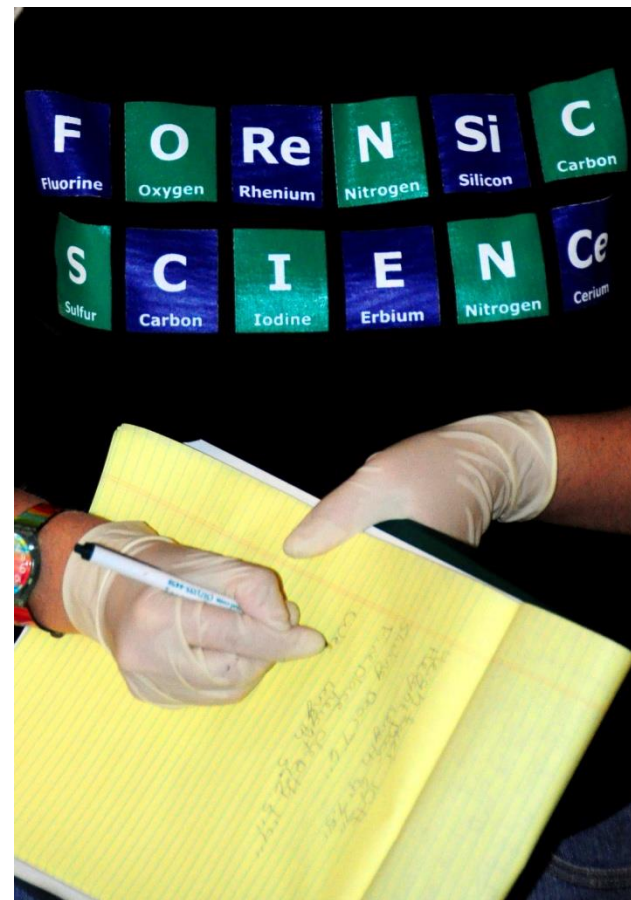
