Hello, and welcome to our tour of the world. I hope that GEO317 - World Regional Geography will surprise, entertain, and enlighten you while you learn about the people and places of earth. I hope you will learn to appreciate the United States of America, too. I always learn something new each semester from the course material and from you, the students. GEO317 starts on 9 January and ends on 4 May. Please check the university academic calendar for course drop dates.

Description from University Catalog:

World regions examined using a synthesis of physical and human geographical themes including environment, culture, landscape, climate, landforms, globalization, population patterns, urbanization, economies, and political geography. No prerequisites, 3 credit hours.

Course objectives:

This course meets General Education Core requirement: International Studies (3 credit hours). As you complete the course material, you will be asked to:

- Recall basic information about the human and physical geography of each world region.
- Identify the locations of countries, cities, and physical features in each world region.
- Explain in your own words world geographical issues by summarizing from a variety of written and online sources.
- Use traditional (listening, maps, and reading) tools and geographic technology to interpret physical and human geography.

Required textbook:

Johnson et al., 2010, World Regional Geography, 10th ed., Prentice Hall. You will be expected to read and learn all textbook material. Please bring the text to every class.

Time inside and outside of class:

You must attend every class meeting! This class, though, consists of more than class attendance. If you are an average student, expect to spend a minimum of six hours outside class each week for this class. Class time will consist of one or more of the following: 1) presentations of major concepts relevant to each world region, generally following the textbook order; 2) short videos demonstrating geography in action around the world; 3) written, map, or computer exercises; 4) discussion.

Structure of the course:

This course is divided into three Units. Each Unit consists of:

- Class attendance, exercises, short assignments, and participation
- Textbook readings completed outside class time
- Textbook chapter quizzes completed outside class time
- Map quizzes completed outside class time
- An exam taken during class time

Grading:

Your grade will consist of:

- Nine textbook chapter quizzes completed on MUOnline outside class time (30-50 points each) for 300 points.
 Chapter quizzes are based entirely on textbook readings. The quizzes are available from the beginning of the course.
 Thus, you will have no excuse for missing one of them. Please work ahead! You can take each textbook quiz two times before the deadline and your average score will count. If you score well the first time, you needn't take it a second time.
- Eight map quizzes completed on MUOnline outside class time (15-30 points each) for 180 points. The quizzes are available from the beginning of the course. Thus, you will have no excuse for missing one of them. Please work ahead!
- Three unit exams completed during class time (worth 60 points each) for 180 points. Unit exams are one-half multiple choice and true/false questions from classroom material and one-half essay with material coming from the textbook and classroom. There are no map quiz questions.
- Class participation and short assignments for 140 points, comprised of attendance, written assignments, and class exercises. You may enjoy reading and discussing articles, having classroom debates, and completing computer or written exercises as part of this class element.

Your final grade will be calculated using the following scale, based on the total number of points you have accumulated:

- A = 800 736 points (100-92%)
- B = 735 664 (91-83%)
- C = 663 592 (82-74%)
- D = 591 520 (70-65%)
- F = 519 and below (less than 65%)

Grades for MUOnline quizzes and multiple choice exams will be available immediately upon completion in MUOnline. Please give me a week to grade class participation assignments and exam essays. You may check with me at any time to find out your grades for participation which are not posted to MUOnline. It is your responsibility to keep track of your grades in this class and rectify any problems immediately. Make the best use of class participation, quizzes, and exams, because no grades will be scaled or curved and there is no extra credit possible.

Schedule:

Each Unit of the course has deadlines for finishing the material. You will have items to complete each week. Please consult the *Schedule* on a regular basis to check the deadlines for all material. No work may be submitted after the deadlines. All quiz deadlines are 11:59pm Eastern USA time on the date listed. All quizzes must be finished in one sitting. You cannot save a quiz to finish later. Each quiz has a time limit during which all questions must be answered.
