THE BENCHMARK OF QUALITY:

ADVANTAGES FOR SCHOOL SYSTEMS:

When a high school teacher is utilized as an adjunct for a dual credit course by Marshall University, the University will bill the school system for only 2/3 of the fee collected from the students. The remaining 1/3 of the funds collected by the school may be used in any way the schools deem appropriate. There is no reimbursement if an adjunct is hired from outside of the high school system.

INSTRUCTOR REQUIREMENTS:

Prospective dual credit instructors must have either (1) a master's degree in the subject matter they will be teaching or (2) a master's degree in another area and 18 graduate credit hours in the subject matter they will be teaching. Interested instructors should submit a current resume and official college transcripts must be submitted via email to the dual credit coordinator. Please email HerdAcademy@marshall.edu for more information.

Teachers will collaborate with the Marshall academic departments to secure textbook and syllabus information, as well as any other instructional materials. All dual credit courses must use the same text and syllabus utilized for courses offered on the Marshall campus.

COUNSELOR EXPECTATIONS:

Once a student has submitted an application for admission to Marshall University, counselors will need to submit transcripts and letters of recommendation via email directly to the Marshall Office of Admissions at admissions@marshall.edu. Marshall dual credit coordinators will assist counselors with managing application credentials.

STUDENT REQUIREMENTS:

High school juniors/seniors must have a cumulative GPA of 3.00 or higher. ACT/SAT exam scores are only required for English (ACT of 18 in verbal/SAT of 480) and math (varies according to the course offered).

High school sophomores/freshmen, in addition to the requirements above, must have test scores that reflect a cumulative score of 24 on the ACT or with other nationally normed tests having an equivalent score.

Students must complete a **free** online Early Admissions application. The course fee is \$25 per credit hour paid directly to the school or county. Most courses are three credit hours.
