About the Herd Academy

If you are a qualified high school student, you can take dual enrollment courses through Marshall's Herd Academy as an Early Start student to start earning college credits before you graduate from high school.

Marshall University offers a variety of coursework options for high school students. Prior to graduating from high school, you can apply to Marshall for early college credit on either a full or part-time basis and can enroll in classes offered online, in your high school, or at one of our campuses.

Please note that students who enroll at Marshall to earn college credits prior to high school graduation are not admitted as freshmen, cannot receive financial aid, and are not eligible for on-campus housing.

Through the Herd Academy, students have access to three different variations of courses:

- **Dual Credit Courses in the High Schools:**
 - Students take courses with other high school students and a qualified high school teacher or Marshall faculty member.
- **Online College Courses**
 - Students enroll in a Marshall online course and complete the online course with college students and Marshall faculty
- **On-Campus Courses**
 - Qualified early entry students who live near one of our campuses can also attend regular college classes in our classrooms.

All three options offer students the chance to get a head start on their college education, potentially saving both time and money in the long run.

Price: \$25 per credit hour or waived for WV students when taking HEPC approved classes with a signed MOU.

What is Dual Credit/Dual Enrollment?

Dual Credit and **Dual Enrollment** are educational programs that allow high school students to earn college credit while still in high school. Though they are related, they have distinct definitions:

Dual Credit:

- **Definition:** Dual credit allows high school students to earn both high school and college credit for a single course. The course is typically taken at the student's high school by either a high school teacher or a Marshall faculty member. Some schools/counties also allow online and campus classes to count as dual credit.
- **How it works:** The student enrolls in a college-level course that is recognized by both the high school and the college. Upon successful completion, they receive both high school and college credit for the same course.
- **Benefits:** This can help students accelerate their education by earning college credits before graduating high school, reducing the time and cost it takes to complete a college degree.

Dual Enrollment:

- **Definition:** Dual enrollment is a broader concept where high school students take college courses while still enrolled in high school, but not necessarily for both high school and college credit.
- **How it works:** A student takes a college course (usually on one of Marshall's campuses or online) and earns college credit. The course may or may not also count toward high school graduation requirements.
- **Benefits:** Dual enrollment programs allow students to experience college-level coursework and prepare for postsecondary education, even if the course doesn't count for high school credit.

Key Differences:

Dual Credit: Students receive both high school and college credit. Often offered as part of an agreement between a high school and a college, usually with a set curriculum.

Dual Enrollment: Students typically receive only college credit (though sometimes it can count toward high school graduation). Students can take a wider variety of college courses, often without needing a direct partnership between the high school and the college.

Admissions

Students may apply to attend Marshall University on either a full or part-time basis prior to graduating from high school. Early enrollment students are subject to the same policies as other Marshall University students, including academic probation and suspension policies. Students who enroll at Marshall University prior to high school graduation are not eligible for freshman admission, financial aid, or on-campus housing. For admission to Marshall as an Early Admission student, applicants must meet the requirements listed below. Students with an exceptional talent in a discipline such as music may request permission to enroll in coursework in that discipline.

Please note that students who have taken college courses during high school and plan to later apply for admission to Marshall University must meet all Marshall University admission standards.

Early Admission Requirements:

- Be currently enrolled in high school or a home-school program.
- Completed admission application.
- A current high school transcript reflecting a cumulative minimum GPA of 3.00 on a 4.00 scale OR a cumulative minimum GPA of 2.00-2.99 and an ACT Composite score of 19 or SAT Total score of 990.
- Maintain a 2.00 GPA in all college courses.
- Meet all course prerequisites.

Course Registration

Upon admission into the Herd Academy, you will register for courses through a Herd Academy staff member.

Dual Enrollment:

Seats are available on a first-come, first-serve basis and students must meet all course pre-requisites. Course offerings may vary each semester.

Dual Credit:

If you are interested in taking dual credit courses, first talk to your school counselor about dual credit options in your West Virginia school. Once approved by your school, a class list will be sent directly to us by your school to register you.

Once registered, students should reference the academic calendar for important registration and withdrawal dates.

Email/MyMU/Blackboard Accounts

All Marshall Students are assigned a personal student ID number, Marshall email, MyMU and Blackboard account. Once admitted as an Early Start student, it will be important to activate your student accounts to have full access to Marshall University's resources, amenities, and all your course content. Without activating your accounts, you will not have access to your school email or any online coursework.

Once logged into your MyMU account, you will find an icon for **Blackboard** under the Quick Links. This is where all your online courses will be found.

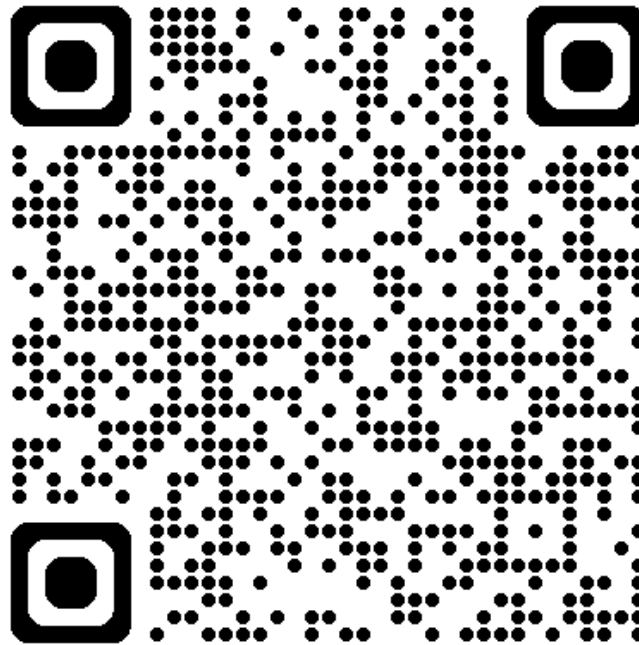
Please note: Once admitted- all correspondence with Marshall faculty/staff should be sent through your official Marshall Email account.

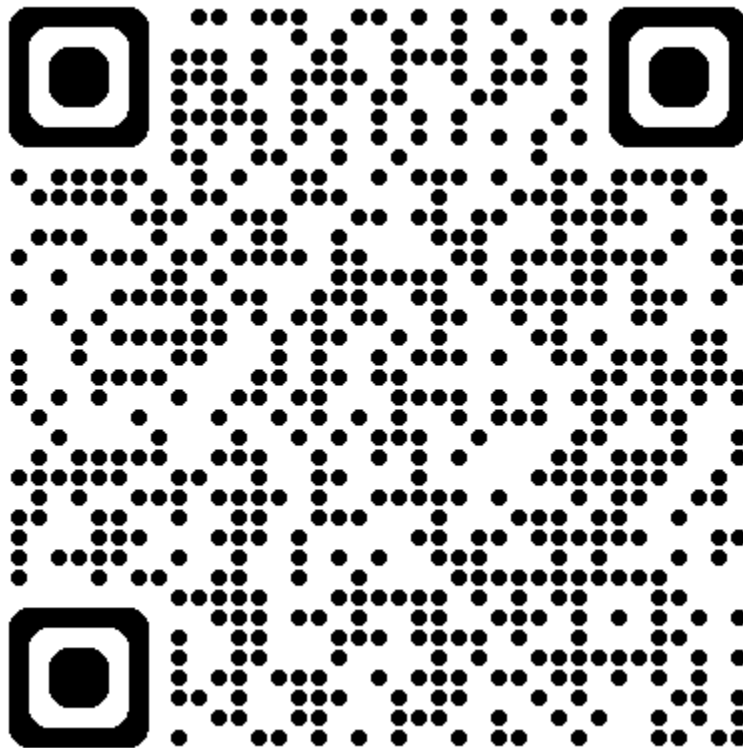

Academic Calendar

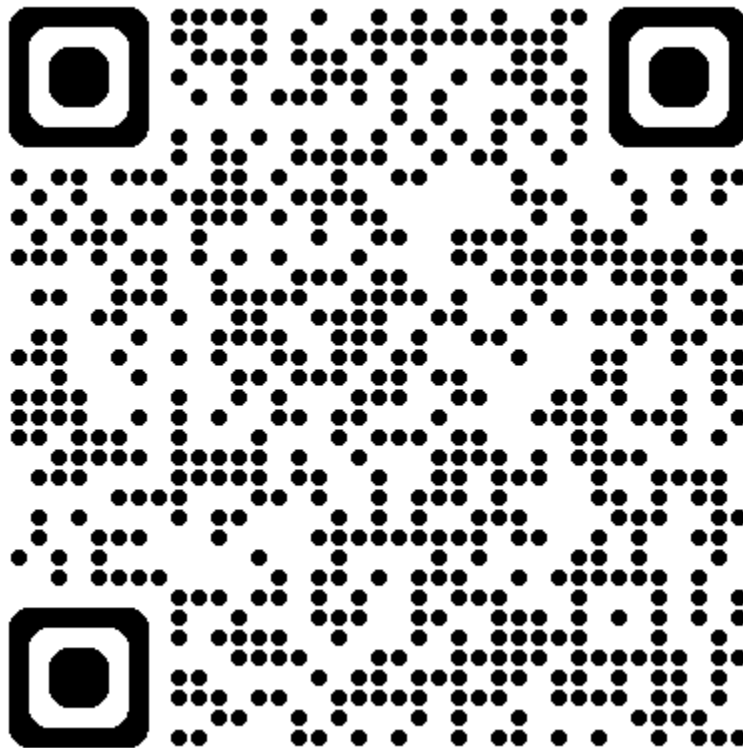
