## Share The Vision Conference 2009

West Virginia's 17th Annual Statewide Substance Abuse Prevention Conference (Share The Vision) will be held at the Charleston Civic Center on November 17 and 18, 2009. This year the conference will be based on the 2009 Governors Drug Summit and will provide an opportunity to officially announce the State's plan for handling substance abuse.

The conference will provide a range of workshops, exhibitions, keynote speakers, and will allow participants to network with a variety of related professionals and organizations. Some time will also be given to the issue of prescription drug abuse, which has become an increasing problem recently and often results in dependence, hospitalization, and fatal overdoses.

Participants can register for the conference online at [www.orevnet.org/stv](http://www.orevnet.org/stv). The fee for registration between October 17 and November 6, 2009 is \$150. Participants may also register at the conference registration desk on the 17th or 18th where a late registration fee of \$175 will be payable. The fee includes all keynote speaker sessions, exhibit access and workshops, as well as a continental breakfast afternoon snacks, and luncheon on the 18th.

**Spotlight on:  
Expansion of Psychology Department's Clinical Services**

Marshall University's Department of Psychology has been given 3,000 square feet of office space at Starlight Behavioral Health in Huntington to expand their clinical services.

The Psychology Department has been offering various services at their campus clinic located in Harris Hall for some time as both a service to Marshall students, faculty, staff and the community and as a training facility for advanced graduate psychology students. But with this expansion, the department will be able to offer services off campus to meet the needs of different people within the community.

The office space was given to the department by the owners of Starlight Behavioral Health Amy and Jack Ingles who are both Marshall University graduates. The office space will be available rent free and

office furniture and telephones are also being supplied.

Starlight Behavioral Health already provides a variety of mental health services for people with mental illness, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities and employs around two hundred and fifty people.

Habitat for Humanity to promote the collection of unwanted denim jeans for recycling.

Containers have been placed around the Marshall University campus for people to place their unwanted blue jeans for collection. The Habitat for Humanity Re-Store on 3rd Avenue in Huntington will also be a drop-off point for anyone wishing to donate.

The denim that is donated can be turned into a material known as UltraTouch™ Natural Cotton Fiber Insulation and is used for the construction of houses in hurricane affected areas. Any

type of denim may be used for this including jackets, shorts, and skirts. The clothing also doesn't need to be in good condition; ripped or stained denim is accepted since it is being recycled into another material.
