Potential Career Paths in Clinical/Counseling Psychology:

- Clinical Psychologist.
 - This path requires receiving either an M.A., M.S., Ph.D., or Psy.D.
- Counseling Psychologist.
 - This path requires receiving either an M.A., M.S., or Ph.D.
- Clinical Research Assistant.
 - This path requires receiving either a B.A. or B.S.
- Licensed Clinical Social Worker.
 - This path requires receiving either an MSW or LCSW.
- Licensed Professional Counselor.
 - This path requires receiving either an M.A. or LPC.

Recommended Minors and Certificates:

- Depending on your area of interest, these minors might be benefical to receive:

- Abnormal Psychology (PSY 508 instead of PSY 408).
- Intermediate Behavioral Statistics (PSY 517 instead of PSY 417).
- Advanced Social Psychology (PSY 606 instead of PSY 302).



Is Graduate Training Required?

- Yes, graduate training is required to become a clinical or counseling psychologist.
 In fact, the only potential career path that does not include graduate training is a Clinical Research Assistant (please refer to slide #4 for more details).
- Depending on the route taken and where you plan to work one day, you might
 have to complete extra schooling (fun fact, WV is one of few states that allow you
 to be licensed as a clinical psychologist with a master's degree. Most states require
 at least a doctorate with licensing). Make sure you check out these requirements
 and more when considering post-secondary education options!

Ways to Stand Out in Clinical/Counseling Psychology:

Clinical Experience:

- Clinical experience is HIGHLY appealing to graduate programs in this subdiscipline. Look for opportunities that best match your population(s) of interest and consider shadowing a therapist.
- Some therapy offices might be willing to take on clinic assistants. This is a great way to get applied clinical experience and additional knowledge about mental health!

Volunteer Work:

- There are many places you can volunteer around Huntington that are applicable to this subdiscipline. Consider volunteering with Harmony House, the Youth Center, or the A.D. Lewis Center for example.
- Working for an emergency/crisis line is an excellent volunteer experience that is highly applicable to the field, and it is a great way to stand out!
- If you are interested in working with child and adolescent populations, consider attending a youth summer camp as a counselor! There are some camps that work specifically with mental health and look for psychology undergraduates as counselors (ex: Mighty Mouth Kids Camp, FIU Summer Treatment Camp, Camp Baker). Remember that, if it is a paid position, then it does not count as volunteering!

Research:

Research experience is essentially required if applying for a Ph.D. (and HIGHLY recommended for Psy.D. and M.A. programs)! Check out the professor's research interests on Marshall's website or ask around! This does not have to be limited to psychology, as Dr. Marianna Linz may have some relevant information about other research opportunities around campus.
