Ways to Stand Out in Corrections/Forensic Psychology:

- Clinical Experience:
 - Targeted experience working with incarcerated individuals is challenging given the strict guidelines surrounding involvement with prisons, but it is possible to volunteer at a prison and gain some insight into the corrections environment.
- Volunteer Work:
