Description: ORVJCF is operated by the Ohio Department of Youth Services and houses over 300 adolescent males, ages 12 to 21, adjudicated for felony charges. Students would have the opportunity work with youth with a variety of mental health disorders, housed on both general population and special programming units (non-intensive mental health unit and “moderate need” and “high need” sex offender units). Training opportunities would include assessment and treatment planning, psychoeducation, individual and group psychotherapy, psychological evaluation and testing, psychiatric consultation, and participation in a multidisciplinary treatment team. There would also be opportunity for school psychology consultation and student evaluations (IEP and MFE) at the facility’s fully accredited high school.

Description: The WV Children's Health Project Mobile Unit is a member of the Valley Health Systems network, in partnership with Marshall University's Department of Pediatrics. Description: **Partial Hospitalization Program:** This is a step-down program for individuals who have recently been hospitalized. Clients attend group therapy Monday through Friday. They attend four group sessions a day, and are supposed to have one individual session a week. The program has a set curriculum, but deviation is permitted. Topics which come up frequently include taking personal responsibility for health and well-being, what constitutes a healthy relationship, establishing trust, conflict resolution, anger management, behavioral treatment of depression, and stigma associated with mental illness. The clients are usually individuals who have struggled with chronic mental illness, including depression, schizophrenia, anxiety disorders, etc. Assessment is rare.

Crisis Unit: This is a voluntary hospitalization setting for individuals who are homicidal, suicidal, or actively psychotic. The average number of clients in the unit is about 8. The unit looks like a residential dormitory and clients attend therapy during the day. Sessions typically involved building hope in hopeless individuals, utilizing problem-solving skills to generate options and choices, and a variety of brief crisis intervention techniques. Sometimes clients are too psychotic to participate actively and attend to sessions, so empathic responding and social support is offered. Many clients struggle with substance abuse, are victims of domestic violence in rural areas, are homeless, or have recently been released from prison.

Childrens Department: I see about six children for individual therapy in this department. They range in age from 10 to 18. The case managers and mentors in this department are all very involved and interested in aiding the therapeutic process in any way they can. Many of them have taken time to meet with me regarding families that they are very familiar with. Many of the children I see have turbulent family histories. Referrals are often for depression, anxiety, and behavioral problems.

Assessment is an area of training that is not emphasized. Time and equipment are often constrained. .
