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"Living Legend" Looks Forward to Retirement

One of Marshall's "living legends" is set to ride off into the sunset.



Dr. Jim Harless, Director of Admissions, will retire in January.

Dr. Jim Harless, MU director of Admissions, will retire January 2nd after 38 years of service, leaving behind a legacy of goodwill, generosity and ambassadorship for the university. He will be recognized during a reception on Friday, December 14, from 3 to 5 p.m. in the John Marshall Room of the Memorial Student Center.

"As director of Admissions for more than 30 years, Dr. Harless became the university's best ambassador," said Dr. George Arnold,

MU Journalism professor. "I am certain that to thousands of teachers and students at hundreds of high schools, Jim Harless IS Marshall University."

Harless, a Marshall alumnus and Charleston native, began his career at MU in 1963 as an administrator in the university's Logan branch. He became director of Admissions after the former director, Brian O'Conner, died in the football plane crash of 1970. "Brian was a good friend," Harless said. "I felt an obligation to help at that time and I still feel that."

During his career, Harless has traveled more than 570,000 miles and contacted more than 300,000 students, all in the name of Marshall University. "I have tried to be a 'people person,' to get out and visit with students in their hometowns," he said. "My goal was to get students, especially those whose parents didn't go to college, to think about coming to Marshall."

Dr. Ernest Earl Middleton, associate vice president for Multicultural Affairs and International Programs and coordinator of the Center for the African American Students' Program, has received the 2001 W.E.B. Dubois Higher Education Award.

The award was given in recognition of exemplary leadership and commitment to improving the quality of higher education. It was presented at the 26th Annual Hall of Fame Awards Program in November at the National

Alliance of Black School Educators (NABSE) conference. Members of NABSE were inducted based on their individual achievements in the field of education who have provided unique service and diligence in carrying out the mission of NABSE.

Middleton was inducted into the Hall of Fame along with actor Robert Guillaume, noted musician George Duke, and California Congresswoman Diane Watson.

Marshall Receives Anti-Tobacco Project Funding

Marshall has received a \$20,000 grant to fund a year-long, anti-tobacco project combining the efforts of students from the Lewis College of Business, the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, and the Office of Student Affairs and Health Education.

The grant comes from the State Tobacco Prevention and Reduction Project through the West Virginia Bureau for Public Health's Tobacco Prevention Program. The project focuses on tobacco use issues among 18-24 year olds.

During the fall semester, marketing and management students from the LCOB and the School of Medicine, along with a graduate assistant in health education, developed and carried out a survey on the behaviors and attitudes involving tobacco use of more than 900 MU students. Students in Dr. Deanna Mader's Promotion Management class, and Dr. J.D. Harrah's Health Care Management class participated in the project.

College of Education Receives Grants from State Dept. of Education

Two grants totaling \$56,000 have been received from the West Virginia Office of the Secretary of Education and the Arts.

Kay Goodwin, secretary of Education and the Arts, announced a \$50,000 grant which will go to MU's June Harless Center for Rural Education Research and Development to help fund several projects, including Arts on Wheels, distance learning projects in small rural schools and developing the center's web page.

A \$6,000 grant from Goodwin's office will provide textbooks for Project ENCOMPASS, which is headed up by Karen Mitchell, an associate professor of mathematics at Marshall. Project ENCOMPASS is geared toward enriching the teaching environment of the state's mathematics teachers by getting them to use more problem solving, writing, presenting, group work and creative thinking in the classroom.

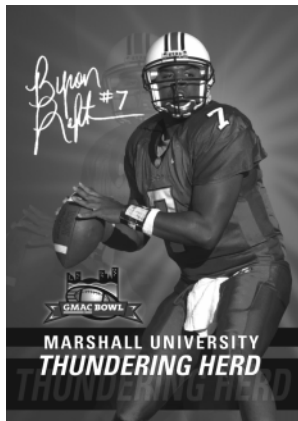

MLK Symposium Receives Grant Funding for 4th Year

For the fourth time, Marshall has been awarded a grant by the Corporation for National Service to help fund two youth leadership programs and a host of other programs honoring the teachings of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., according to Dr. Betty Cleckley, vice president for Multicultural Affairs and International Programs.

The Martin Luther King Day of Service Initiative grants are awarded annually to groups that organize service projects which honor King's legacy and the spirit of his teachings through bringing people together to solve community problems.

Marshall is one of only three organizations in West Virginia, and the only higher education institution, to be awarded the grant. Braxton County Coalition, Inc., and Unity Housing, Inc., of Morgantown, also received grants.

"As in years past, the Martin Luther King Day of Service Grant will prove to be a welcome source of funding for the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Symposium's youth related events," said Cleckley. "These programs are designed to help transform the youth of today into the leaders of tomorrow by instilling within them Dr. King's value of civil rights and social justice."

Through funds from the grant, MU is sponsoring several programs and activities to honor King's legacy on Martin Luther King Day, January 21, 2002, and throughout the year.

After his retirement, Harless will serve on a part-time basis as a recruiter for Alumni Development at Marshall. He will also enter the ministry, serving as a Lay Minister for the Presbyterian Church.

"I have been fortunate to work with outstanding people at Marshall University," he added. "I would just like to say thank you to all the staff, faculty and administrators that I have had the pleasure to work with throughout the years."
