## 'Barney,' 'Dorf' Head for Huntington Nov. 21

Legendary funnymen Don Knotts and Tim Conway are teaming up for a night of laughter when they come to the Keith-Albee Theatre for two performances on Thursday, Nov. 21 at 6:30 p.m. and 9 p.m.

West Virginia native and five-time Emmy Award winner Don Knotts made his mark on American comedy with his flawless portrayal of Barney Fife on "The Andy Griffith Show."

Born in Morgantown, his ambition from boyhood was to be in show business. Although he intended to become a teacher and enrolled in West Virginia University as a speech major, the army called so he spent the next few years touring the South Pacific, doing comedy routines in "Stars and Gripes." But once out of the service and after finishing college, he headed for New York City, where he finally realized his dream of making it big in show business.

Tim Conway, known to his peers as "the comedian's comedian," was born in Willoughby, Ohio. He had a fast rise in show business from staff member of a Cleveland television station to becoming a regular on "The Steve Allen Show," a featured performer on "McHale's Navy"

television series, and eventually a cast member on "The Carol Burnett Show."

Conway starred in several of his own TV shows, and like Knotts, he has five Emmy Awards. His most recent project has been a series of home videos starring his successful character, Dorf.

To round out the evening the comedians are bringing impressionist Louise DuArt, who has been called by some the world's greatest impressionist. She has been hailed by critics for her dead-on impressions of such marquee favorites as Kathie Lee Gifford, Judge Judy, Joan Rivers, George Burns, and Jane Fonda, to name a few.

# Home Loan Program Available to Marshall Employees

Marshall University has partnered with the West Virginia Housing Development Fund in a state-funded program that offers new low-interest, low-down payment home loans for university employees, President Dan Angel announced last week.

The Employer Assisted Loan Program is designed for individuals and families who have sufficient income to make a mortgage payment, but lack the funds necessary to cover the down payment and closing costs.

As a result, employees may qualify for below market, fixed interest rate loans as low as 5.95 percent with as little as a 3 percent down payment, which can be financed through a second low-interest loan. This feature allows a family to realize home ownership with as little as \$500 or 1 percent of the house sales price, whichever is less, toward the home purchase at the time the loan transaction is completed.

The university's financial participation in the program will be in the form of support for workshops on budgeting for potential participants.

"We are thrilled to be able to provide a way for our employees to achieve the American Dream of home ownership," President Angel said. "Home ownership is vital to the well being of an employee and his or her family, on or off the job."

Jon W. Hatfield, West Virginia Housing Development Fund Executive Director, described the partnership as "a win-win situation for Marshall University and its employees."

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Mortgage terms vary based on income and the prevailing rate of interest at the time of inquiry. Existing or newly constructed homes located in West Virginia are eligible. Mortgage refinancing is not available under this program.

The West Virginia Housing Development Fund is a public body corporate and governmental instrumentality of the State of West Virginia, established to increase the supply of residential housing for persons and families of low and moderate income, and to provide construction and permanent mortgage financing to public and private sponsors of such housing.

## Maddox Memorial Established

The History Department has established an annual thesis research award to honor the memory of Dr. Robert F. Maddox, who died Sept. 30. Maddox, a history professor and an administrator at Marshall for 36 years, was the author of three books as well as numerous scholarly articles, and did a great deal to encourage graduate students to engage in historical research.

His widow, Bonnie, and his colleagues in the History Department feel that an award which will help finance the thesis research of deserving students is a fitting way to honor him.

**Mildred Battle**, Assistant Professor in the General Studies Division at the MU Community and Technical College, and **Linda Hunt**, Assistant Professor in the College of Education, along with Kay Thompson, a faculty member at Ashland Community College, made a presentation at the 10<sup>th</sup> Annual Teaching and Learning Conference in Ashland, Ky. on Oct. 12. The title of their session was "Math Anxiety," in which they discussed the characteristics of math anxiety, its assessments, recent research, and using learning styles to ameliorate math anxiety.

Michael Mullen to recruit doctoral scholars for faculty positions, **Dr. Betty Jane Cleckley**, Vice President for Multicultural Affairs and International Programs, participated in the Compact for Faculty Diversity Ninth Annual Institute on Teaching and Mentoring, held in Arlington, Va., Oct. 24-27. The Institute is conducted by the New England Board of Higher Education, Boston, the Southern Regional Education Board and the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education in collaboration with participating colleges/universities and state agencies.

The second edition of *The History of Vocational Education in America*, by Dr. Howard R. D. Gordon, Professor of Adult and Technical Education, has been published by Waveland Press, Inc. The book discusses the history, philosophy, legislation, and organizational or curricular structure of vocational and technical education, including in-depth examinations of topics such as gender, ethnicity and special needs populations. It primarily is used at land-grant universities throughout the United States and in countries such as Canada, Albania and Russia that offer undergraduate and graduate degree programs in career and technical education.

## Profile: Cammy Holley

A series on interesting Marshall University people.

Her first experience with Marshall didn't start too promisingly—she got lost in Gullickson Hall—but she stayed the course. Now she's delighted she found her niche in the university.

With self-deprecating humor, Cammy Holley, currently an administrative associate for the College of Information

Technology and Engineering (CITE) recounts the day she showed up for her job interview and almost got waylaid by an erroneous sign. A native of Catlettsburg, Kentucky, she wasn't familiar with the university, didn't know anything about it, didn't know where anything was. But she did know, after talking with friends, that she wanted to work here.

So with meticulous planning, she did everything the job-hunting manuals tell you to do. She left home in plenty of time, got to the campus early, found a parking place—no easy feat, located Gullickson Hall and then, to her amazement, couldn't find room 112.

"The sign designating room numbers clearly pointed to the left so that's where I went," she recalls with a laugh. "But there was no room 112. There was construction work going on and I kept coming back to my original place. I was so afraid I was going to be late, I was beginning to panic. But Dr. (Robert) Barnett, had seen me going by his office time and time again and asked if he could help. He quickly showed me the way—the sign was wrong—and I made it to the interview. I always say I wouldn't have been hired if it hadn't been for him!"

The job she accepted in January 1995 was working for Dr. James Hooper in the Center for Environmental, Geotechnical, and Applied Sciences (CEGAS), then part of the Marshall University Research Corporation. In 1998 the Graduate School of Information Technology and Engineering (GSITE) was formed with the merger of West Virginia Graduate College and Marshall University. Subsequently, Holley says, Safety Technology undergraduate and graduate degree programs and the pre-engineering program were transferred into GSITE and ultimately evolved into the College of Information Technology and Engineering (CITE), where she now works.

She's busy juggling a full load of assorted duties, including working in the dean's office for Dr. Betsy Dulin, who was named dean last summer, and Assistant Dean Elizabeth Hanrahan. And after finding room 112, she's still there seven-and-a-half years later.

She brought a wealth of job experience with her when she came to Marshall. Born and reared in Catlettsburg, she earned an associate degree at

the inside temperature has been higher than the outside. He has walked to work when snow was two and three feet high to shovel snow and put down salt for the safety of the students to get in and out of their buildings."

The nomination notes, "Clarence has moved many semi-trailer loads of furniture and carried hundreds and hundreds of mattresses on his back in the residence halls. At one time, Clarence had to walk up to the Butler Building (a storage building) and Central Receiving pulling a two-wheel dolly to bring 55-gallon drums of cleaning supplies weighing 250 to 350 pounds. He has carried tens of thousands of bags of trash from the residence halls in rain, snow and all types of weather. Clarence has cleaned, vacuumed, mopped, waxed and buffed...miles of floors and carpets."

Tubbs concludes by saying, "He is trustworthy, dependable and an outstanding person. Clarence Martin is a shining star for the Department of Residence Services. We can always count on him to do his best and to brighten up our days. Clarence Martin is our 'Energizer Bunny.' He never stops...he just keeps going and going!"

President Dan Angel presented Martin with a plaque, balloon bouquet and a check for \$100. He will be eligible for the Employee of the Year Award.

In addition, the No. 6 Pfizer Ford, driven by NASCAR star Mark Martin, will be on display from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 16 at the Radisson Hotel. Photo opportunities will be available from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m.

The goal of the conference is to provide family physicians and other health care professionals with an update on diagnosis and treatment of common medical problems. More than 1,300 people are expected to attend.
