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Campaign Exceeds Halfway Point

Marshall's Campaign for National Prominence, which began its public phase last September, has exceeded the halfway point, according to Dr. H. Keith Spears, Vice President for Institutional Advancement and one of the campaign directors.

Currently, gifts and pledges total \$52,913,000, more than half-way to the goal of \$100 million, Spears said.

"We've had a substantial outpouring of individuals who want to help

The MU Alumni Association is seeking nominations for the first annual Dr. Carolyn B. Hunter Distinguished Faculty Service Award. The deadline for nominations is March 31.

The \$1,000 award is named in honor of Dr. Carolyn Brindle Hunter, an outstanding teacher, administrator and employee whose dedication and loyalty to Marshall University spanned a 30-year period.

Yeager Presents Gift to Namesake Society

Brigadier General (Retired) Charles E. "Chuck Yeager has presented a check for \$50,000 to the Society of Yeager Scholars from the newly formed General Chuck Yeager Foundation.

The presentation was made last fall during Yeager's annual visit to Marshall University to meet the incoming class of scholars during the Yeager Symposium, a week-long event sponsored by Verizon to thank the community for its support of the program. The check was presented to Martha C. Woodward, executive director of the Yeager program, at the board of directors meeting on the final day of the Symposium.

"I'm pleased to present this check to Martha, the diesel engine that keeps the Yeager Scholars program running," Yeager said. "I had to sign a lot of model airplanes to make this gift possible," he joked, "but when I meet these remarkable young people with such a thirst for knowledge I know it's well worth it."

"General Yeager continues to surprise and inspire," Woodward commented. "He truly exemplifies the ideals and image of an American hero."

Yeager has been extremely generous in contributing much of his personal memorabilia to Marshall University. Currently the collection includes the pitot tube from *Glamorous Glennis*, the famous Bell X-1 the general flew during his legendary flight to break the sound barrier on October 14, 1947. The pitot tube, located three feet in front of the nose of the X-1 to measure speed and altitude, was the first part of the aircraft to go supersonic. He has also donated models and photographs of all the planes he has flown, to Marshall, as well as other photo-
