



# A MESSAGE FROM ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

As the Fall Semester draws near, we are delighted to present some of the exciting highlights awaiting us this academic year at Marshall University. Emerging talents, innovative concepts, and inspiring projects await, and together, we will embark on a journey of discovery and learning. Here is a glimpse of some of the key highlights featured in this report:

- Dr. Maria Gindhart became the new Dean and hosted the prestigious West Virginia Governor's School for the Arts for the seventh time.
- Marshall University and West Virginia University were designated Centers of Excellence in Cybersecurity, and their undergraduate Cyber Forensics and Security program earned recognition as a Center of Academic Excellence in Cyber Defense by the National Security Agency.
- The undergraduate teacher preparation program earned an "A" grade from the National Council on Teacher Quality for its rigorous instruction in reading methods, and the college is ready to launch an internal reorganization pilot to improve program offerings.
- The COHP Integrated Behavioral Health Center received licensure for the next two years, and the Master of Social Work program gained full accreditation reaffirmation for 8 years from the Council on Social Work Education.
- Over one-third of COLA majors are advancing toward graduation by enrolling in summer classes, with seventy-nine students completing their graduation requirements this summer.
- The Master of Forensic Science Program's 2023 cohort achieved #1 in overall performance on the Forensic Science Assessment Test (FSAT), maintaining a remarkable record of excellence.
- The Bill Noe Flight School expanded its operations with a new location at West Liberty University, providing high-quality aviation education to a wider talent pool.
- The LCOB Doctor of Business Administration (DBA) program successfully saw six students from its inaugural cohort defend their dissertation proposals, paving the way for them to move on to data collection and analysis, adding to the program's academic achievements.
- The School of Pharmacy partnered with CVS to provide a regional technician preview day of the school.

In addition to our academic units, our numerous student support services and programs report that:

- The Center for Student Success accompanied Provost Avi Mukherjee to deliver certificates to 135 campus personnel recognized for their contributions to student success and retention.
- Thirty Student Support Services (SSS) TRIO students attended summer school with supplemental grant aid assistance, focusing on improving academic standing and degree completion.
- The Intercultural and Student Affairs Division contracted with Ready Education to develop a new MU app, enhancing student engagement and communication.
- Online Education is a state leader in the development and implementation of HyFlex classes. Diana Adams, Eric Himes, and Sandra Stroebel made presentations sharing our processes and the results of our pilot study completed in April.
- Online Education was invited to write a Johns Hopkins University Press chapter, focusing on technology-supported rural engagement at Marshall University.
- University librarians launched Herd Books, a new reading program to engage the Marshall community in sharing book recommendations for inclusion in the Recommended Reading site.

On behalf of Academic Affairs' administration and staff, we extend a warm invitation to join us in celebrating the scholarly and creative achievements of our faculty and staff, as well as the successes of our students and alumni. Let us all share our pride in the academic accomplishments that continue to enrich our university community.

# COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING AND COMPUTER SCIENCE (DEAN: DR. DAVID DAMPIER)

#### **PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS**

- Marshall University and West Virginia University have been designated as Centers of Excellence in Cybersecurity for Critical Infrastructure. Both schools are the only two universities in the country to receive this designation.
- The undergraduate Cyber Forensics and Security program was designated as a Center of Academic Excellence in Cyber Defense by the National Security Agency.
- The graduate program in Cyber Forensics and Security ranked second in *Fortune's* Best Online Master's in Cybersecurity Degrees in 2023.

#### STUDENT & ALUMNI ACHIEVEMENTS

- Eric Dillion, a Yeager Scholar and recent graduate with a B.S. in Computer Science, has been awarded a Phi Kappa Phi Fellowship in the amount of \$35,000. He will attend the University of Cambridge in England and pursue a Master of Philosophy in Digital Humanities. Only two of these prestigious fellowships are awarded in the U.S. each year.
- Eight students from the MU Institute for Cyber Security began their paid internships with the WV Intelligence Fusion Center. The students will complete cyber forensics and open-source intelligence collection and analysis.

- The GenCyber Summer Camp for high school teachers was held in June. The camp, taught by faculty from CECS and COS, assists teachers in developing and integrating cyber subjects into courses at their home schools.
- The MU Institute for Cyber Security hosted a Cybersecurity Tabletop Exercise on June 30 with participating organizations including Marshall University, MU Health, the City of Huntington, Alpha Technologies, and Ohio Valley Physicians. The event was moderated by members of the U.S. Critical Infrastructure and Cyber Security Agency.

# COLLEGE OF EDUCATION AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT (DEAN: DR. TERESA EAGLE)

#### **PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS**

- The internal reorganization of COEPD is ready to launch in pilot mode for the fall. Faculty and staff have worked diligently for the last two years to determine how to improve the various functions of the college to best serve our students and stakeholders. COEPD appreciates the support received from Academic Affairs in rethinking our programs, leadership, recruitment, and retention efforts for the future of the college and the field of education in general.
- Over 250 course sections were offered by the COEPD during the summer terms. Not including staff development and contract courses, these sections generated 3,479 student credit hours. The summer term is vital to programs for educators who can devote more time to their own education while PreK-12 schools are not in session.
- The undergraduate teacher preparation program was recognized by the National Council on Teacher Quality (NCTQ) for its rigorous preparation of future teachers in how to teach reading. The program earned an "A" grade in NCTQ's June 13 report, *Teacher Prep Review: Strengthening Elementary Reading Instruction.* The program is among just 23% nationwide and three in West Virginia to earn an "A" from NCTQ for meeting standards set by literacy experts for coverage of the most effective methods of reading instruction. COPED congratulates Dr. Mindy Backus, Dr. Mindy Allenger and CI department chair Dr. Chair Paula Lucas for their hard work.

- The June Harless Center is also working to open a second classroom in the fall. This classroom will accommodate infants and toddlers. Collaborations with Child Development Academy Director Brittany Jobe have been very productive in extending the reach of the MU EE STEAM center.
- COEPD welcomed members of the Country School Association to campus on July 19. The organization had seen information about the One-Room Schoolhouse along with other restored schoolhouses in southern WV including Heritage Farm. The Association are exploring locating their June 2025 national conference on the MU campus. Drs. Neil and Ruthann Arneson participated in welcoming them to campus.

- The COHP Integrated Behavioral Health Center received licensure by the West Virginia Office of Health Facility Licensure & Certification (OHFLAC) for the next two years. The were no negative findings by the State Surveyor.
- The Master of Social Work program received full accreditation reaffirmation for 8 years from the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE).
- The MSW program partnered with the Graduate Humanities Program in COLA to provide courses for the Aging in Appalachia graduate certificate. COHP will continue to partner with Humanites to develop a Gerontology Social Work graduate certificate for fall 2024.

#### STUDENT & ALUMNI ACHIEVEMENTS

• All 26 students from the SOPT Class of 2023 passed the National Physical Therapy Board Examination in April (100%). Eight additional students took the NPTE on July 25-26.

- David Nelson, Assistant Professor of Social Work and Director of the Behavioral Health Center, assisted Lincoln County and Mason County schools in maintaining school social workers by linking them with behavioral health entities to support these positions. These school social workers will be encouraged to participate in the MSW program's School Social Work Certificate program which will begin this fall 2023 semester. Robin Looney, MSW Clinical Instructor and WVTIME4K Treatment Coordinator, will be the director of the certificate program.
- The WVTIME4K Prevention program received a \$15,000 Palatine grant to fund 6 mentees who will work in the local City Mission with homeless children and elementary schools to provide mental health and prevention activities. Robin Looney, Treatment Coordinator, will serve as principal investigator for the Palatine grant.

• The College of Liberal Arts has been productive during the summer session. Fifty-nine faculty are teaching 130 summer courses and over a dozen independent study and graduate research projects. COLA summer courses enrolled over 1,750 Marshall students and 1,375 students from other colleges, with 375 COLA majors making progress toward their degrees. Over one-third of COLA majors are advancing toward graduation by enrolling in summer classes. Progress in summer is vital to advanced students with seventy-nine students completing their graduation requirements this summer (57 undergraduate, 13 graduate, and 9 PsyD graduates).

### FACULTY & STAFF ACHIEVEMENTS

- Dr. Zeli Rivas, professor of Japanese, took a group of 20 students to Tokyo, Japan and Seoul, South Korea to study computer animation and anime/comics.
- Dr. Ida Day, associate professor of Spanish, partnered with professor emerita Maria Carmen Riddel to provide a study abroad experience in Madrid for 14 students in June and July. The students lived with host families and completed coursework at the University of Nebrija focusing on language learning and cultural understanding.
- Dr. Wendi Benson, first year assistant professor of Psychology, earned recognition from Marshall's Center for Student Success for her work with online students in her courses. Dr. Benson came to Marshall with significant experience in online teaching. She has produced over 100 videos for use by distance students in Psychology. Dr. Benson was praised for her leadership, innovation, kindness, and effective mentorship of online students.
- The College hired 13 new faculty members this spring and summer. Dr. Rich Jones, Jr. is the new chair of the Communication Studies department; Dr. Aaron Comstock joins the Anthropology faculty as an archaeologist; Dr. Sydnor Roy is a new assistant professor in Humanities specializing in Greek, Latin, and classical literature; Dr. Manamee Guha and Dr. Molly Mersmann are new faculty members in the History Department; Dr. Shahinoor Rahman joins the growing department of Geography; Maxfield Bennett is a new instructor of Japanese in the Department of Modern Languages; Dr. Joseph Billingsley joins the Psychology faculty; and the Department of English welcomed assistant professors Dr. Sarah Walton, Dr. Paul Robertson, and Dr. Dan Normandin, as well as instructors Kallel Peterson, Jillian Hovatter, and Cat Dennison.

# STUDENT & ALUMNI ACHIEVEMENTS

• Tatum Bock received a \$20,000 grant from the Board of Trustees of Prichard School for the Campus Christian Center. Tatum is a graduate student in Communication Studies who earned her RBA in 2021. She completed the CMM Grant Writing class in fall 2022 and

developed her class project into a successful grant proposal. The project will provide funds for building maintenance and support at the Campus Christian Center.

- Derek Scarbro has been named Director of the Marshall Advanced Manufacturing Center (MMAC). Derek, a 2003 graduate in Political Science and International Affairs, has been with the center since 2017 and interim director for the past year. Prior to that, he worked as Campaign Manager, Transition Director, and Director of Intergovernmental Affairs for Governor Jim Justice.
- Dr. David Rodgers was recently appointed to the Board of Directors of Stone Belt Arc, an organization that provides resources and support for individuals with disabilities. Dr. Rogers earned an MA in Communication Studies in 1999. After completing an EdS and EdD at Marshall, he pursued a career in health care and medical education. He was Associate Director of Education for CAMC, Clinical Educator at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, Manager of Interprofessional Learning and Simulation at Penn State's Hershey Medical Center, and, most recently, Clinical Assistant Professor of Medicine and Director of the Interprofessional Simulation Center at Indiana University. Since 2007, Dr. Rodgers heads a consulting firm training clients in patient simulation programs and curriculum integration.
- Dorian Williams is a 2004 graduate of Marshall's Sociology program. He earned an MS in Healthcare Administration in 2007. Williams is now Assistant Vice President of Operations at WVU Medicine Camden Clark Medical Center. Last year, he was named one of the *State Journal's* "Generation Next: 40 Under 40" in West Virginia.
- Charlene Leonard begins her tenth year at Halyard Health with a promotion to Product Manager. She is a 2004 Communication Studies graduate with an emphasis in Organizational Communication. She worked for Coca-Cola for 7 years before joining Halyard Health in 2013.

- The Psychology Department and School Psychology programs at Marshall are partnering with the Ohio County Board of Education to provide tuition for Ohio County teachers to complete courses toward certification as school psychologists. This joint effort of the College of Liberal Arts and the College of Education and Professional Development will help increase the mental and behavioral health support in the schools at a reduced cost for teachers and school psychologists who commit to working at least 3 years in their district.
- Faculty from the College of Liberal Arts, the College of Arts & Media, and the Cabell County and Putnam County Schools collaborated to conduct 4 weeks of programming for the Japanese Immersion Camp this summer. The camp is extremely popular among elementary school-aged children in the two counties with 60 students each week participating – 240 students total. The camp is led by Dr. Nacky Anderson, associate professor of Japanese. She was assisted by Miyuki Cook, assistant professor of Art & Design and Akiko Praylow, Japanese Outreach Coordinator for Marshall University, as well as several student and community volunteers.

- Dr. Wesley Stites began his role as the new Dean for the College of Sciences. Interim Dean Brian Morgan briefly stepped back into the role of Associate Dean before starting his new position as Vice President for Institutional Research and Planning. Brian did an exemplary job and will be sorely missed. A search is underway for a new Associate Dean.
- The College of Science underwent a reorganization from nine departments to five. The departments of Mathematics and Physics, Natural Resources and Earth Sciences (NRES), and Criminal Justice, Criminology, & Forensic Sciences (CJCFS) were formed by merging previous departments together.
- The Master of Forensic Science Program's 2023 cohort collectively achieved #1 in overall performance on the Forensic Science Assessment Test (FSAT). The program has achieved this ranking 12 out of the past 14 years.
- The Undergraduate Program in Cyber Forensics & Security has been designated a Center of Academic Excellence in Cyber Defense (CAE-CD) by the National Security Agency (NSA). The National Centers of Academic Excellence in Cybersecurity (NCAE-C) program is managed by the NSA's National Cryptologic School and federal partners. The designation is valid until 2028.

- Dr. Tom Cuchta and Dr. Trung Truong will join the Department of Mathematics & Physics in the fall as assistant professors. Mr. Ian Waddell will join as a Temporary Instructor. Dr. David Brink-Roby will join NRES. He will replace Dr. Ron Martino who retired in the spring.
- Dr. Maria Hamilton (Mathematics and Physics) attended the North American Einstein Toolkit School and Workshop, July 17- 21, 2023, and the 15th Edoardo Amaldi Conference on Gravitational Waves, July 17-21, 2023. Dr. Hamilton gave public talks on "Calibration and Validation of Binary Neutron Star Simulations" and "Unlocking the Universe: Gravitational-Wave and Multi-Messenger Astrophysics. She also secured a 2023/24 NASA EPSCoR Seed Grant for \$17,788.
- Dr. Herman Mays (Biological Sciences) received a National Science Foundation Mid-Career Award (MCA) in the amount \$224,476 for his project "MCA: Avian systematics, speciation, and adaptation across large island archipelagos." Dr. Mays will serve as the Principal Investigator.
- Dr. Derrick Kolling (Chemistry) published "Excess manganese increases photosynthetic activity via enhanced reducing center and antenna plasticity in *Chlorella vulgaris*" in *Scientific Reports*. The article was co-authored with the help of two graduate students, two undergraduate students, one high school student, and two high school teachers.

- Dr. Kimberly Kunkler (CJCFS) published "Reducing the impact of cognitive bias in decision making: Practical actions for forensic science practitioners." in *Forensic Science International: Synergy.*
- Dr. Rick Gage (NRES) returned from China where he participated in an international research collaboration with colleagues from Central China Normal University and Colorado State University. The team is exploring the efficacy of using nature-based tourism as a vehicle for poverty alleviation in rural, mountainous areas in China, with potential application to other regions.
- Dr. Min Kim (NRES) is participating in a research project aiming to restore the summit of Cadillac Mountain in Acadia National Park.
- Dr. Mike Caudill (NRES) has been in the field with students collecting core samples to investigate the region's glacial events and paleo-environment.
- Dr. Mindy Armstead (NRES) has a team of undergraduate and graduate researchers collecting algae samples and water chemistry in the Ohio River and tributaries. Armstead's group is collecting field data supporting a larger group of collaborators using machine learning and modeling to predict harmful algal blooms in the river.

Both Dr. Cuchta and Dr. Wintz worked with Dr. Lawrence on the machine while they were students at Marshall.

- In June, West Virginia GEAR UP hosted a program for several hundred middle school students from eleven WV counties. Several COS faculty attended and provided workshops for students.
- The Health Science and Technology Academy (HSTA) held their "Fun with Science" Summer Institute on July 11. Drs. Sean and Sachiko McBride presented four workshops. Students saw exciting demonstrations highlighting the basic properties of sound waves and got to make their own musical instruments to take home with them.
- Dr. Autumn Starcher presented to 800 4th-6th graders during the Mason County Youth Outdoor Expo. She also taught a soils class to 120 rising 9th graders at Marshall's recent HSTA Science Camp.
- Dr. Rosalynn Quinones-Fernandez was joined by undergraduate students in May to demonstrate acid-based experiments to students at Chesapeake Middle School.
- Also in May, Dr. Derrick Kolling and members of Alpha Chi Sigma demonstrated the chemistry of Tardigrades to students at Highlawn Elementary School.

- The Chief Aviation Officer is pleased to announce an additional location of the Bill Noe Flight School at West Liberty University with classes expected to begin in the fall of 2024. This new location will be fully served by the technologically advanced Marshall University airplanes and Marshall's top tier flight instructor force. The addition of this location will further enhance Marshall's mission of producing high-quality talented aviators to enter one of the most sought-after professions available today. This is significantly important as this location creates additional 'Line of Sight' to the opportunities that aviation has available to the very talented pool of professionals from West Virginia.
- The Bill Noe Flight School welcomed the incoming class of future aviators and their families in mid-July for a customized orientation. New students and their families engaged with current student ambassadors, faculty members, and Chief Aviation Officer Bill Noe. Feedback from the students' families was immediate and tremendously supportive. Aviation will be working with admissions to host this for each semester.
- Marshall University Aviation participated in the 2023 WV GEAR UP Summer Academy in June. Twenty-six aviation students learned about the Four Forces of Flight, weather and aviation careers and then applied their new knowledge to build a model airplane. The event welcomed 150 rising 8th and 9th grade middle school students. Participants were exposed to college campus life, participated in classes based on career interests, attended leadership and team-building sessions, and engaged in exciting educational activities aimed at preparing and encouraging students to explore post-secondary options.

- Marshall University Aviation and Brian Givens, FAA FAAST Program Manager, hosted a meeting on June 16th for Flight School and Aviation Maintenance Technology students, faculty, and staff. Aviation community members also attended. The FAAST meeting focused on mitigation of flight risk and safety culture within a flight organization.
- Twenty rising 9th grade students from Boyd County Schools visited the Bill Noe Flight School on June 7th. Students learned about the Four Forces of Flight, airfield maintenance, aviation careers and airport security, toured the facilities including the hanger and aircraft, and spent time in the flight simulators.
- The Bill Noe Flight School welcomed 5 single day internship opportunities and multiple tours for students from area high schools including Nitro High School, Parkersburg High School, and Ironton High School along with college transfer students from Virginia State University and the University of North Carolina.
- On June 26th, the Bill Noe Flight School held a one-day summer camp for 5 young ladies from the Black Diamond Girl Scout Council. The girls received instruction on the Four Forces of Flight, wing design, aviation careers, and toured the facilities. They also visited West Virginia International Yeager Airport and the state of West Virginia aviation hangar to experience flight simulators. Each aviation camper experienced a flight on "Air Marshall" followed by signing their first logbook and receiving "wings".
- The Aviation Maintenance Technology program hosted 60 middle school students from Wayne County schools during the month of June. Students toured the facilities and received instruction on aviation maintenance.
- More the 15 aviation students, faculty, staff, and family members volunteered for Marshall University's annual Community Cares event. The group spent an afternoon landscaping around the university dorms.
- The Flight School Safety Team hosted the 130th Air National Guard Flight Safety Team for a safer flight operations meeting at West Virginia International Yeager Airport. The meeting focused on formation flight of C130 aircraft in flight pattern, separation with the Flight School's aircraft fleet, and the sharing of flight schedules. This was the first safety meeting that will occur monthly at alternating locations. The meetings will focus on additional safety areas with the next being preflight operations. They will eventually be opened to all within the West Virginia International Yeager Airport community.

- Dr. Don Capener, the new Dean of the Lewis College of Business, started on July 3. He is already making an impact on the college by planning the fall retreat, filling open positions in the dean's office, and working with faculty and staff to grow enrollment.
- The Lewis College of Business hosted the West Virginia Governor's School of Entrepreneurship (WVGSE) this summer from June 18 through July 8.
