A Message from Academic Affairs

Greetings!

The summer has been generous, giving us time to recharge our batteries and to generate new ideas, projects, and programs. Worth noting is the progress of the Strategic Enrollment Management (SEM) plan, where work is now being completed at the college and division levels. Additionally, the End-to-End (E2E) Student Experience project is now underway, and we will be introducing a new student mentoring program in the coming month!

There are numerous highlights included in this edition of the Provost Report. Some of those include:

- Professors Ian Hagarty and Danny Kaufmann, in the College of Arts and Media, exhibited their visual art project *Shared Reverence <u>Commemorating the New River Gorge at the 6th edition of the European Cultural Centre's (ECC)</u> international art exhibition entitled <i>Personal Structures* during the 59th *La Biennale di Venezia* in Venice, Italy, which started April 23 and will continue through November 27, 2022.
- Professor James McIntosh, in the College of Engineering and Computer Sciences, received \$85,000 to support his project titled: "Examining the value of using Safety professional, reviewing companies with and without Safety Professionals."
- 3. Elbert Davis, Assistant Professor in Curriculum and Instruction, won the Blackboard Exemplary Course Program Award from BlackBoard for the significant achievements that have been accomplished within the course "Sociology of American Schools" submitted for peer review.
- 4. Jamie Maxwell, Kelly Rutherford, Lisa Fry, Pamela Holland, Ariana Rigon and Audrey Lankford, all from the Communication Disorders department in the College of Health Professions, recently published two research articles in the *American Speech Language Association Journal*. The first was "Perceptions of Speech-Language Pathologists' Service Provision in the Opioid Epidemic: A Focus Group Study" and the second was "Perceived Clinical Characteristics of Children with History of Opioid Exposure: A Speech-Language Pathology Perspective." Both studies revealed relevant and meaningful clinical implications.
- 5. **Dr. Eric Lassiter**, professor of Graduate Humanities in the College of Liberal Arts, was named President of the Historic Glenwood Foundation Board of Directors in June. Dr. Lassiter is Director of the Glenwood Center for Scholarship in the Humanities. The Glenwood Foundation has sponsored a number of educational initiatives and provided financial support for students in the Graduate Humanities program.

- 6. The College of Science proudly reports that the graduating class of Marshall University's Master of Science in Forensic Science program has **again** earned the highest collective score in the nation on the Forensic Science Assessment Test (FSAT). Since the program was accredited in 2005, Marshall's M.S. Forensic Science students have ranked No. 1 for 11 of the 13 years that they participated.
- 7. **The Division of Aviation** reports that the AMT program received FAA Part 147 certification in late June. With this certificate, we have all the needed approvals to open in Fall 2022.
- 8. The **Lewis College of Business** reports that the West Virginia Governor's School of Entrepreneurship completed its three-week residency at Marshall University. Olen York served as Dean of the Governor's School.
- 9. **Dr. CasSandra Ashby**, a 2019 graduate of the Pharmacy School, was awarded the Walgreens Customer Care Champion of Champions Award for providing immediate care to a customer in need. She provided life-sustaining CPR to a patient who stopped breathing while in her pharmacy.

In addition to our academic units, we are including – for the first time – items from our numerous student support services and programs. These units include:

- 1. The **Office of Admissions and Enrollment Services** provides weekly reports on enrollment. As of the week of July 25th, the number of applications, admissions, and deposits paid for transfer students are all higher than a year ago.
- Kristin Sims, Jennifer Brown, and Samantha Aretz, staff members in the Office of Career Education, all earned their Certified Digital Career Specialist certification from the Professional Association of Resume Writers and Career Coaches. The certification prepares them to provide effective LinkedIn coaching.
- 3. The **Center for Teaching and Learning** hosted and facilitated a Faculty Learning Community with a focus on Hyflex course design, with an emphasis on best practices and equity.
- 4. The **Center for Student Success** reported that Jay Rader, Assistant Director, completed two nationally recognized trainings this summer: the Appreciative Advising Institute and Supplemental Instruction.
- 5. The Division of Intercultural and Student Affairs reported that Johnathan McCormick, Director of Military and Veterans Affairs Director, recently represented the MU veteran/military community on Senator Joe Manchin's Veteran Council this summer successfully advocating for the Senator to protect current governmental resources provided for veterans through the VA Air Commission.
- 6. Ashley Grimmett, a student in the **Student Support Services TRIO Program**, is one of the nearly 3,000 undergraduate students from across the United States selected to receive the Gilman Scholarship to study or intern abroad through April 2023. Gilman Scholars will study or intern in 91 countries. **Grimmett** is a junior double-majoring in psychology and Japanese and said she plans to use the Gilman Scholarship for the bilateral exchange program between Marshall and Kansai Gaidai University in Hirakata, Osaka, Japan.

- 7. University College is pleased to report that the HERD Start Early Academy, a unit within University College that focuses on providing high school students opportunities to acquire college credits while still in high school, is growing! Currently, the Academy has partnerships with:
 - a. 11 counties
 - b. 22 public schools
 - c. 5 private schools
 - d. 40 teachers in high schools
 - e. 6 paid adjuncts
 - f. 21 different courses
 - g. 55 total courses

FACULTY ACHIEVEMENTS

A faculty research team comprised of Jamie Maxwell, Kelly Rutherford, Lisa Fry, Pamela Holland, Ariana Rigon and Audrey Lankford in the Communication Disorders department recently published two research articles in the *American Speech Language Association Journal*, titled Perceptions of Speech-Language Pathologists' Service Provision in the Opioid Epidemic: A Focus Group Study. The purpose of the study was to identify current practices being implemented with children who have a history or suspected history of opioid exposure, as well as challenges faced by speech-language pathologists in the schools. The second study, Perceived Clinical Characteristics of Children with History of Opioid Exposure: A Speech-Language Pathology Perspective described the clinical characteristics of children with a history of opioid exposure as perceived by the speech language pathologists (SLPs) treating them.

Both studies revealed important clinical implications derived from the reports of participants.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Dr. Nacky Anderson, associate professor of Japanese and Akiko Praylow, our Japanese Outreach Coordinator, led the 10th annual Japanese Immersion Camp for 3rd to 6th graders. Community interest in the camp is so great that enrollment for the camps fill in less than one day. Cabell County Schools, Putnam County Schools, and the WV Department of Education are key partners in this program, and the camps receive substantial funding and material support from Toyota, Okuna International, Nippon Tungsten, Taste of Asia, and RCBI. In addition to the two sessions conducted at Altizer Elementary School, this year the camp expanded to Putnam County with a session at Scott Teays Elementary School.

Scott Teays Elementary School is also the home of the **Japanese Saturday School**, a collaboration between Marshall University and the WV Department of Education. The Saturday School offers traditional Japanese instruction for the children of visiting business executives at Toyota, Diamond Electric, and other Japanese businesses in the region.

Several COLA faculty taught courses abroad this year. **Dr. Shawn Schulenberg**, Political Science professor, worked with students in Argentina this summer, as he has done with the Kentucky Institute for International Studies (KIIS) program for the past several years.

Dr. Julie Snyder-Yuly, assistant professor of Communication Studies, led a month-long summer program in Berlin and Barcelona, studying the art, history, and culture of these two iconic European cities.

Dr. Zeli Rivas, Professor of Japanese, offered a two-week summer program in Japan, visiting the cities of Nara, Hiroshima, and Kyoto. Students learned language and culture, as well as attending workshops demonstrating textile dying and calligraphy.

Assistant Professor of Spanish, **Dr. Ida Day** and retired Spanish professor **Dr. Maria Carmen Riddel** led the long-standing summer program at Universidad Nebrija in Madrid, Spain. Students spend a month in Spain studying at the university and traveling on weekends to cultural artistic and historical sites

Dr. Eric Lassiter, professor of Graduate Humanities, was named President of the Historic Glenwood Foundation Board of Directors in June. The foundation preserves the property and history around the Glenwood estate, built for a member of the Laidley family in the 1800's and occupied by the Summers and Quarrier families until the 1980's. Dr. Lassiter is Director of the Glenwood Center for Scholarship in the Humanities. The Glenwood Foundation has sponsored several educational initiatives and provided financial support for students in the Graduate Humanities program.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- The College of Liberal Arts offered 142 classes this summer, enrolling nearly 1700 students.
- Summer orientation has been successful for COLA with 146 students attending summer orientation.

This summer she is serving as a Law Clerk in the Western District of Virginia. Her past internships have been with the White House Legislative Affairs office, the Department of Defense, and the Southern District of West Virginia.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

- Representatives from the College of Science and College of Engineering and Computer Sciences met jointly with Bill Walker, Deputy Executive Director of the United States Cyber Command/Join Force Headquarters-DODIN on the continuation of an academic partnership. This partnership will begin to add resources to the Institute of Cyber Security (ICS), bringing research and additional cybersecurity education opportunities to the University.
- On June 28, 2022, members of WVU, WVDHHR, and the CBRN (Chemical, Biological, Radiation, Nuclear and Explosives) Enhanced Response Force Package (CERFP) unit of the WV National Guard visited Marshall University's Infectious Disease Surveillance Labs (MUIDSL). The focus of the visit was to introduce these emergency planners and responders to the capabilities of the MUIDSL has functioned and grown for the past 2 years since it was formed under Chuck Somerville in late 2020 MUIDSL consists of labs in each COS (sampling and prep), FSC (DNA/RNA extraction), and Pharmacy (PCR testing). MUIDSL is in close collaboration with WVDHHR and WVU and currently funded by WVDHHR and CDC under the Enhancing Epidemiological Lab Capacity program.

FACULTY AND STAFF ACHIEVEMENTS

- Dr. Eugene Shakirov, an assistant professor of biological sciences at Marshall University, was awarded a \$1.18 million, four-year grant from the National Institutes of Health (NIH). The NIH R01 grant from the National Institute of General Medical Sciences will support his research, "Genetic and epigenetic architecture of natural telomere length variation." The highly competitive grant award is a renewal of his earlier award (2018-2022) and will continue to fund his research on telomeres, the physical ends of chromosomes which shorten with age. Shakirov is the principal investigator and will work with a team of collaborators from the University of Texas at Austin and Texas A&M University with expertise in biochemistry, genomics and computational biology. An R01 grant is among the most competitive grants issued by the NIH, and Shakirov's may be one of the largest to be received by Marshall's Department of Biological Sciences.
- The Department of Chemistry received the gift of a new scholarship (Romans-Hess, \$25K principal) and researcher fellowship (Romans-Hess, \$25K principal). Since March, faculty have made 5 conference presentations (4 international, 1 national) and students three presentations (6 students in total).
- **Dr. Rosalyn Quinones** ended her sabbatical with 2 publications (Quantification of Cannabis in infused consumer products and their residues on skin and Analysis of cannabinoids in lotions using High-Performance Liquid Chromatography).

STUDENT & ALUMNI ACHIEVEMENTS

• Brian Morgan, a son of Marshall University and a graduate of the College of Science, assumed the role as Interim Dean of the College of Science on July 1. Brian began his tenure at Marshall as an undergrad student athlete (baseball) and went on to earn both his bachelor's and master's degrees from the university before joining the faculty in 2000. Brian taught in the Computer and Information Technology Department for 20 years (8 as department chair) before serving as the Associate Dean for the College of Science for the past two years. "Being able to serve my alma mater in this capacity truly means a great deal to me. I am humbled and honored, and promise to work tirelessly on behalf of the college, university, and community as Dean."

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Bill Noe Flight School:

- Our inaugural class completed their first year a total of 24 students completed.
- 3 students have earned their private pilot license, and 18 have taken their first solo flight.
- We started the first Women in Aviation chapter in West Virginia there are 18 members to date.
- For our 24 current students, the median GPA is 3.125 and 75% have a GPA of 3.0 or greater.
- For Fall 2022, we have 26 confirmed and accepted students (with 19 additional in the process still needing medicals, etc.).

Aviation Maintenance Technology Program:

- The AMT program received our FAA Part 147 certification in late June. With this certificate, we have all the needed approvals to open in Fall 2022.
- Renovations for the second hanger is nearing completion. The old gun range in the first hangar is completely renovated, and the final steps are being taken for this building including pneumatic air supply and upgrades to HVAC.
- We are actively recruiting for the fall; our target is a first class of 30 students.

STAFF & FACULTY ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Bill Noe Flight School:

- We have 6 flight instructors on site (plus the assistant chief). One more is inbound and 2 flight instructor positions are open.
- We trained 4 check instructors who are certified by the FAA and one Chief Flight instructor who received certification for all courses in June.
- We just hired a second aircraft mechanic and will soon hire a student assistant for the maintenance shop.
- We hired one student assistant to work at the dispatch desk and will hire a second student assistant in the fall to support 16 hrs per day, 7 days per week operations.
- We are moving to 7-day rotation of operations in late July.


