## PUTTING IT TOGETHER: COACHING AND ECPBIS IN WEST VIRGINIA

On June 19th, eighty-three participants completed our first statewide Early Childhood Practice Based Coaching trainings. These sessions were facilitated over three separate Zoom meetings. Our Early Childhood Behavior Support Specialists, Jess George and Sara Smouse, along with our Early Childhood PBIS Coordinator, Dr. Amy Carlson, each presented a ninety-minute session covering coaching topics and guidance on how practitioners can use coaching to support implementation of the Early Childhood Pyramid Model in West Virginia.

With all of the COVID-19 restrictions, we find ourselves adapting in many ways. We also see this great flexibility and eagerness to “roll with it” from our stakeholders and coaches across the state. We wanted to take this opportunity to say, “Thank you!,” to all those who participated. We look forward to launching the expansion of ECPBIS in the coming months.





## VIRTUAL TRAINING FOR YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TO BE OFFERED SOON

Youth Mental Health First Aid instructors recently began training to deliver Virtual YMHFA to school personnel in West Virginia. We will be rolling the new options out prior to the 2020-2021 school year.

There will be three options for delivering the training:

1. 6 1/2 hours face-to-face (the traditional method of delivery)
2. 2 hours of online content and 4-hour session with a trainer (face-to-face)
3. 2 hours of online content and 4-hour session with a trainer (virtual)

Option 3 will be available soon, and due to restrictions related to COVID-19, this is the best option currently.
