

Executive SUMMARY






Affiliation AGREEMENTS

- Legal (FERPA, Agreement Alterations or Terminations)


Affiliation agreements are signed by the Presidents and Provosts of both institutions.




Articulation AGREEMENTS

Articulation agreements are signed by the Provosts and appropriate Deans of both institutions.








(Building Bridges): Fall 2023 Programming Morris Lecture

- We have more diversity at Marshall than I originally thought.
- People from different cultures are very interesting to get to meet.

- Although we're from different places, we're all very similar.
- People from different backgrounds still have a lot of the same interests.
- That people are joined by many interests even after having come from different continents/countries.
- Met other international students.
- There are more veterans on this campus than I thought.
- Meeting people is a lot of fun!
- Learned more about the countries the food came from.
- 82% of respondents said they had made new friends as a result of attending the dinners.

(Building Bridges) Fall 2023 Programming inner Group Feedback regarding Food

- Food varies around South America... I thought it would be similar to Hispanic foods that I've seen before, but it was very different.
- Learned of all the different foods enjoyed in Turkey.
- Difference between authentic food and Americanized food.
- A lot of cultures use the same kinds of food but make them their own by adding different spices, sauces, and pairing them with different foods.
- I learned about the kinds of foods eaten by other cultures and how they are cooked.
- These dinners often have food that is not stereotypical food of the respective countries, and I have learned a lot about different foods that I didn't know of!









Fall Enrollment

% Year over Year Change





African-American





Goal 2: Increasing Access and Support Student Enrollment Trends




Fall Enrollment










Evaluating the Campus Climate

umber of responses ranged from a high of 978 to a low of 972 (2022) and from a high of 1,396 to a low of 1,062 (2023)



MARSHALL % of respondents who indicated.....


Concerns

Reasons: Respondents could choose as many as were applicable






% of respondents who indicated **only occasionally or rarely having serious conversations** or **socializing** with individuals who differed from them in the following categories:






How often do you hear about programs, activities, or events that promote inclusion happening on campus and how often do you attend these events?
