Health Care Management program gains membership of AUPHA

I am delighted to announce that our undergraduate Health Care Management program has gained membership of The Association of University Programs in Health Administration (AUPHA), which is a global network of colleges, universities, faculty, individuals and organizations dedicated to the improvement of health and healthcare delivery through excellence in healthcare management and policy education. Its mission is to foster excellence and drive innovation in health management and policy education, and promote the value of university-based management education for leadership roles in the health sector. It is the only non-profit entity of its kind that focuses on improving the delivery of health services throughout the world by educating professional managers. 3rd place: Margie Phillips (Sustainability & Entrepreneurship in Distressed West Virginia Counties) - \$200 cash award

A total of 34 people, including several students, attended Research Day.
