All Applicants

- Undergraduate GPA of 2.5 or higher
- A total of 286 on the verbal and qualitative sections of the GRE or at least a 30 or a scaled score of 378 on the MAT

• The Preschool Special Education (PSE) specialization does not require an undergraduate degree in education. The program is designed with all required course work including student teaching and leads to teaching certification.
