## \* Honors Curricular Requirements

Our required curriculum consists of **24 credit hours across** two "halves" with flexibility for students to choose how they want to complete our overall requirements.

## → Lower and Upper-Division Seminar and Experiential Learning Requirements (12 credit hours)

- Lower-Division Seminars (6 credit hours)
  - FYS 100H First-Year Seminar (a General Education course)
  - HON 200 Second-Year Seminar
- Upper-Division Seminars & Selected Experiential Learning Courses (6 credit hours)

All students must complete **at least ONE section of HON 480** and may take either one section of HON 300 or two sections (total of 3 credits in sequence) of HON 483 as an <u>alternative</u> to a *second* section of HON 480. Historically, most students complete two sections of HON 480.

- HON 300 Honors Peer Mentoring
- HON 480 Special Topics Honors Seminars
- HON 483 TEDxMarshallU Internship (requires taking two *consecutive* semesters for a total of 3 credit hours)

## → General Honors Requirements (12 credit hours)

12 credit hours must be achieved through some <u>combination</u> of the following:

- Departmental, honors-designated [H] courses Courses offered by various departments to honors students (typically as General Education courses), e.g., ANT 201H.
