MAJOR INFORMATION

- All students desiring entry into the B.A or the music minor must be formally admitted to the music program. This admittance is based upon an audition in the student's major performance area (instrument or voice) and an interview with the area faculty. Students desiring to enter the composition area of emphasis should be prepared to show evidence of music theory study and/or compositions. Students should contact the music office to arrange for an audition and interview.
- Candidates for the B.A. in Music must complete 51 credit hours of study in music. $\bullet~$ Forty (40) credit hours must be earned in courses numbered 300-499.
- All coursework in the music major must be completed with a grade of C or above. A course with a grade of D or F must be repeated with at least a grade of C to count for graduation or be used as a prerequisite for another required course.
- Upon completion of the fourth semester of 100 level applied music study in the principal performance medium, students must pass a sophomore hearing to demonstrate achievement of the appropriate applied music level and for admittance to upper division (300-level) applied music study in the principal performance medium. Students are permitted a maximum of two attempts to pass the sophomore hearing.
- Demonstration of piano proficiency is a graduation requirement in all music and music education degree programs. Completing MUS 179D with a minimum grade of C satisfies this requirement.

- In the B.A. program in music, students must complete a minor area of study outside of music, which should account for 15-18 credit hours. Also, 17-29 of credit hours in additional elective courses must be completed. Up to 12 credit hours of these additional elective courses may be in music; the remaining hours must be in non-music subjects. Students may elect to combine the minor area of study and the additional elective hours to work toward a second major area of study.
- General Emphasis: Students may select any 14-16 credit hours of music (MUS) courses to complete this emphasis area.
- Commercial Music Emphasis: MUS 219, 227, 327, 427, 495, College of Business course (selected from ENT 220, MGT 320, MKT 340, or other approved course), three (3) credits
- Music History Emphasis: MUS 200, 250 or 290 (not selected above), 360 or 361 (not selected above), 301; one course selected from MUS 227, 308, 401, 480-483, 485-488
- Pedagogy Emphasis: applied music (4 semesters, 300-level), two applied pedagogy courses and two applied literature courses (in student's applied performance area),
- Vocal Jazz Emphasis: applied voice (4 semesters, 300-level), MUS 205, 231, 260, 312, 405, 412, 460, two (2) credits music electives (upper division)

- Have a minimum of 120 credit hours (some colleges or majors require more);
- · Have an overall and Marshall Grade Point Average of 2.00 or higher;
- Have an overall Grade Point Average of 2.00 or higher in the major area of study;
- Have earned a grade of C or better in English 201 or 201 H;
- Have met all major(s) and college requirements:
- · Have met the requirements of the Core Curriculum;
- · Have met the residence requirements of Marshall University, including 12 hours of 300/400 level coursework in the student's college (see section entitled "Residence Requirements" in the undergraduate catalogue);
- Be enrolled at Marshall at least one semester of the senior year;
- · Have transferred no more than 72 credit hours from an accredited West Virginia twoyear institution of higher education.

Colleges and specific programs may have unique requirements that are more stringent than those noted above. Students are responsible for staying informed about and ensuring that they meet the requirements for graduation.




